Grapes symbolize the wine, His sacrificial blood, while wheat represents the bread, His body broken for believers. Each element invites reflection on Christ's love and redemption.




"I am the vine; you are the branches."

This verse beautifully illustrates the deep connection between Christ and His followers, symbolized by the grapevine—a powerful emblem of unity and communion. Its simplicity and profound meaning make it a perfect choice for engraving on stained wood.



The acanthus leaves and volutes in the decorative panels symbolize eternal life, spiritual ascension, and unity, serving as a bridge between the community and touristic spaces. These motifs echo the church's layered history, its transformative journey, and its enduring, cyclical impact on the lives it touches.





The olive branch is a recurring symbol throughout scripture, first appearing in Genesis 8:11 after the flood. In his desperation to find land, Noah repeatedly sent out doves. It was the third dove that returned, carrying an olive branch in its beak—a powerful representation of peace and reconciliation.



In the book of Isaiah, the prophet spoke about the restoration to come through salvation. Correlating the long-lasting life of a Cypress Tree-that there will be an everlasting sign of the Lord's eminence. Isaiah 55:13



The fig tree has been a representation of prosperity in the book of Deuteronomy. Specifically in chapter 8- Moses addresses the Israelites and reminds them of the land God has promised them- if only they kept their eyes on Him.
