

# The National Headquarters

---


- The National Headquarters for The March on Washington is located on 170 West 130th Street.
- It was built in 1884 as a single family home and went through a complete remodel by the African American Architect Vertner Tandy in the 1920s.
- During the 1920's, the house was used as a home for troubled African American girls, The Utopia's Children's house and a day care center.
- The Headquarters is where Bayard Rustin, a gay pacifist, and Philip Randolph worked on the details that made the march as successful as it was.



# The Why

- The structure itself was designed by an African American Architect for the African American Community.
- This building stands as a reminder of the power we have to make a change much bigger than ourselves.
- Symbolizes a home for everyone in the African American Community.
