WHAT IS THE HAMILTON GRANGE NATIONAL MEMORIAL?

- LOCATED IN HARLEM, NEW YORK CITY
- FORMER HOME OF ALEXANDER HAMILTON, FOUNDING FATHER AND FIRST SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY
- PRESERVED AS A NATIONAL MEMORIAL UNDER THE NATIONAL PARK SERVICE.
- MOVED TWICE, CURRENTLY LOCATED IN ST. NICHOLAS PARK
